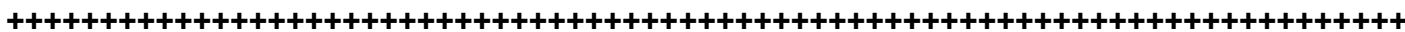

THE AKC IS FOR OUR PET WESTIES TOO!

When you hear American Kennel Association (AKC), most of us probably think about dog shows for pure bred dogs with pedigree papers and an AKC registration, which doesn't include most of our dogs. But did you know that the AKC also has many competitive and fun programs that our dogs, even without pedigree papers and even of mixed breed, can participate in and can even win titles in, recognized by the AKC? The only requirement is that your dog be registered or listed with the AKC. Although registration is only for pedigreed dogs, listing is open to most of our Westies even if they have uncertain parentage, are of mixed breed, and are neutered/spayed.

Some of the activities open to listed dogs include Agility, Canine Good Citizen, Rally, Earthdog, Scent Work, Therapy Dog, Tracking, Trick Dog, Search & Rescue, Barn Hunt, etc. These are all fun activities for both you and your dog.

Information on these events can be found on the AKC.org website, and I will discuss many of these programs in upcoming articles but in this article, I want to explain how you can register your dog with

the AKC in order to participate as that is a prerequisite. I will be focusing on the two registration programs that are open to almost all our Westies.

The first listing category is the “Purebred Alternative Listing” (PAL). This category is open to any Westie (or other AKC recognized breed) six-months old or older and neutered/spayed; that is judged by the AKC to display the purebred Westie physical characteristics. Their judgment will be based on your application information, and front view and a side view photographs of your dog. You will also need to include a nonrefundable application fee of \$35.00.

It will take about three weeks for a determination.

If your dog is approved, it will be issued a PAL listing certificate in your dog’s name qualifying the dog to participate in most AKC programs/competitions except Confirmation. In addition, you will get a one-year subscription to the “AKC Family Dog” magazine, a complimentary visit with any veterinarian in the AKC Veterinary Network, and 30-days of Pet Insurance Coverage.

I have personally listed my Westie rescue, Duncan, in this program. For my application I also included a Wisdom DNA test result. This is not required but it will certainly help in the determination if it indicates 100% Westie genetic ancestry in its results.

Now if your Westie isn’t or can’t be approved for PAL listing because it is not obviously a Westie or is of mixed breed, don’t despair! There is still an AKC listing option for you. This is called the “AKC Canine Partners.” This listing category is for mixed breed and hybrid dogs and allows them to participate in many AKC recognized dog sports/activities and earn AKC recognized titles in many of the same events as the ones open PAL listed dogs.

As a “AKC Canine Partners” listed dog owner, you will receive an official “AKC Canine Partners” certificate that records your dog’s name and place in history, AKC Reunite™ pet recovery service, one-year subscription to the “AKC Family Dog” magazine, a complimentary visit with any veterinarian in the AKC Veterinary Network, and 30-days of Pet Insurance Coverage.

Cutaneous Lymphoma

Cutaneous Lymphoma

It originates in the skin and can take the form of reddened lumps that can be itchy at times and also cause extreme discomfort in dogs.

Symptoms—

They appear as ulcers, nodules, plaques, ulcers, and erythemic or exfoliative dermatitis. In the early phases scaling, alopecia (loss of hair), and pruritus (itching) are seen. As the disease advances, the skin becomes more erythematous, thickened, ulcerated, and exudative (relating to the oozing of fluid). There may also be oral involvement that can appear as multicentric erythematous, plaque like lesions or nodules on the gums and lips.

Diagnostic technique and clinical staging-

For cutaneous lymphoma, punch biopsies (3-4mm) should be taken from the most representative and infiltrated, but not infected skin lesions. Staging procedures vary and stage does not hold any prognostic importance.

Treatment-

The treatment of cutaneous lymphoma depends on the extent of the disease. Solitary lesions may be treated with surgical excision or radiation therapy. Fractionated radiotherapy has been associated with long term control. Diffuse non-T-cell lymphoma is best treated with combination chemotherapy. Retinoids, (chemical compounds related to Vitamin A) like isotretinoin (Accutane) and etretinate (Tegison) have yielded gratifying results in canine T-cell cutaneous lymphoma.

A combination of polyethylene glycol (PEG)-L-asparaginase, (30mg/kg given intramuscularly weekly) have proved to be effective on dogs with cutaneous T-cell lymphoma. However, remissions are not long-standing. Prednisone may also be useful in controlling pruritus. Studies have indicated that pegylated-liposomal doxorubicin (Doxil) has produced remissions. As a basis of experimental studies dogs were treated with CCNU (50 mg/m² given orally every 3 weeks).

Mechlorethamine (Mustargen) can be applied on the skin as an aqueous solution or an ointment base. The solution is prepared by mixing 10 mg of mechlorethamine with 50 ml of tap water. For preparing 900 mg of ointment, 90 mg of mechlorethamine is mixed with 10 ml of absolute alcohol and sufficient xipamide (Aquaphor). It is essential to remove hair before applying the ointment. Gloves must be used, since mechlorethamine is carcinogenic (cancer causing) and can cause contact hypersensitivity in humans.

Prognosis-

Cutaneous Lymphoma in dogs has a few treatment options. Dogs suffering from canine T- cell lymphoma were treated successfully with Isotretinoin for up to 13 months. Dogs treated with Doxil have been found to produce remissions in 40% cases. Although most of these were short-lived responses, remissions of 1 year or longer have occurred. Dogs treated with CCNU showed complete response and two of those responses were relatively durable (7 and 15 months). Dogs with diffuse T-cell lymphoma under the impact of combination chemotherapy with cyclophosphamide, vincristine, cytosine, arabinoside and prednisone (COAP) attained a median remission duration of longer than 250 days and a median survival of longer than 399 days.
